# **EYE SEE...EYE LEARN PROGRAM**

All kindergarten aged children (children born in 2019 or 2020) are eligible for free glasses if required.

Eye exams for children ages 0-19 are covered by OHIP annually. If they require glasses, the Eye See... Eye Learn program will provide one pair of glasses per child.

### **SELF- ADVOCATE COMMITTEE UPDATE**

As of March 2024, the current members of the self-advocacy group include Rosemary C, Ron S, Rebecca H, Raquel K, and Debbie A. In previous meetings, members engaged in discussions on various topics important to them. The current focal points for the group are: advocating for an increase to ODSP funding to meet the rising cost of living and the affordability of housing, and addressing safety concerns for pedestrians due to e-bikes using sidewalks instead of main roads. Additionally, the group is actively identifying essential tools for self-advocates in their daily lives, such as utilizing personal devices (cell phones, emails, etc.) to foster independence.








### **BCCL CELEBRATES COMMUNITY LIVING MONTH 2024**



### **ACTIVE ASSIST PROGRAM**

ActiveAssist is a fee subsidy program offered by the City of Brampton, designed to help low-income families and individuals in Brampton participate in Recreation programs. Confidentiality is always maintained. This assistance is given in the form of a credit to your account.

All you need to apply for this subsidy is proof of residency (ex. driver's license, utility bill or lease agreement), proof of total family net income and proof of legal responsibility for all dependents listed on the application. Once the application is completed & accepted a credit of \$275 per eligible family member will be applied to your account.

# ONTARIO ELECTRICITY SUPPORT PROGRAM (OESP)



If you are a customer of an electricity utility and in a lower-income home, you may qualify for a reduction on your electricity bill.

The OESP will reduce the cost of your household electricity by applying a monthly credit directly to your bill. The credit amount will depend on how many people live in your home and your combined household income.
